Ernest Hemingway once described "courage" as "grace under pressure." As an abstract noun, the word "courage" is an elusive word and difficult to define. And yet, we know what it is when we see it, experience it or read about it. Join us as we examine the lives of four individuals: Anne Hutchinson, Eugene Debs, Alice Paul and Jackie Robinson, who in their own way personified courage, right conduct and sense of duty.

Gary L. Hylander PhD, Boston College, is an independent scholar who specializes as a presidential historian and is a renowned history professor in the Boston area.

Stolen Art: A Righteous Journey

This series will explore the history of art spoliation by the Nazis in various countries, including persecution of artists, galleries and dealers involved in the art industry, utilizing case histories from private as well as public collections. We will also discuss the means by which looted art has been scattered throughout the world after the Second World War and how this affects contemporary issues in art restitution and return of cultural property.

Yvonne Illich, MA Columbia, is a legal anthropologist and archeologist by training with expertise in cultural heritage issues and crimes against art. She is actively involved in the Survivor and Second Generation of Holocaust survivors' community. Her expertise in Holocaust looted art and provenance research stems from her work researching family histories and collections in support of restitution claims for art and other property stolen from individuals, communities and nations. She has prepared and negotiated claims in different international forums.
