

Hearing Loss: Communicating Across the Lifespan

Hearing loss is very common across the age spectrum—from infants to seniors. Everyone knows people with hearing loss but few people know how to effectively communicate with them. In this course, you will learn how to talk to people with hearing loss of any age, dispel major myths about hearing loss, and learn what those with hearing loss need from their communication partners. This class is limited to ten people.

The New York Times called John Updike the "Tireless Chronicler of Small-Town America." He was a prolific twentieth-century novelist who won the Pulitzer Prize and other writing accolades. The major themes of his Rabbit Angstrom novels—sex, faith, and art—play out in stories set firmly in middle-class America. In this course, we will read two short stories and his *Rabbit, Run* novel. Course meetings will include a mini-lecture and discussion of readings.
